
If you do not wish to purchase a parking tag, a parking permit may be purchased through the ParkMobile app for \$5 a day.

Atlanta: Cradle of the Civil Rights Movement

Februrary 16, 2023

Between 1940 and 1970 Atlanta was the epicenter of the American Civil Rights Movement as black leaders fought for voting rights, access to public facilities and institutions, and economic and educational opportunities for African Americans. A Park Ranger at the Martin Luther King, Jr., National Historic Park will conduct a 2.5 hour tour that will include the Birth Home of Martin Luther King, Jr.; The King Center with Dr. and Mrs. King's Tomb, the Eternal Flame, and Freedom Hall; Fire Station No. 6. Participants will also see the BEHOLD monument that was unveiled on January 11, 1990 by Mrs. Coretta Scott King as a tribute to her husband and as an inspiration to all who fight for dignity, social justice, and human rights.

Participants will walk through the World Peace Rose Garden located in front of the Visitor Center. When in bloom, the garden boasts 185 roses in different colors and scents and is the site for the annual contest for students across the world to submit poems of peace.

A private lunch will be served at Mary Mac's Tea Room in Midtown Atlanta. Established in 1945, it is the last of sixteen tea rooms once found in downtown Atlanta. The tour will then continue at the National Center for Civil and Human Rights which opened in 2014. It connects the American Civil Rights Movement to human rights challenges across the world today. Participants will enjoy taking a self-led tour of the facility that includes Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s papers and artifacts, the history of the American Civil Rights Movement, and stories about the worldwide struggle for human rights.

The Martin Luther King, Jr. National Historic Park will be a fast-paced walking tour covering a large part of the park's 35 acres. The tour requires considerable standing and walking over several city blocks, sidewalks and city streets.

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Day Trip to Beautiful Gibbs Gardens

April 13, 2023

Meander through the gardens at your own pace and enjoy lunch on your own at The Arbor Cafe with fellow OLLI members. The gardens are designed by Jim Gibbs, the retired founder of Gibbs Landscape Company. The property is 376 acres making it one of the nation's largest residential estate gardens. There are 21 garden venues including five feature gardens on site. In early spring we can hope to enjoy late season daffodils, tulips, cherry blossoms and dogwoods blooming. As in any garden, there may even be surprises! The paths in the Valley Gardens are level and wide. There are many benches–126 in the Valley Gardens alone–providing a comfortable place to sit and relax while taking in the beauty of the gardens. The paths are covered with a ground granite that stays firm in dry weather. They are not paved. As such, they may soften following rain.

Modern Warfare - A look at the evolution of warfare in the 21st Century

Warfare has evolved significantly since the fall of the Berlin Wall and the collapse of the Soviet Union. There was a significant shift from large, national armies to Non-State groups, terrorist groups, Private Military Companies, and lone wolf actors. Additionally, the nature of war has also changed. Today, outer space is a battleground, as is the internet and cyber space. This course will explore the evolution in warfare and how the battlefield could be in some far-off distant land, in your neighborhood or in your laptop.

Lawrence Saul

Military historian and Colonel (retired) Lawrence Saul served for 37 years in the US Army, including tours in Germany, Holland, Belgium, England, Kosovo and other locations. He was one of the last veterans of the Vietnam War still serving on active duty when he retired in 2008. A dedicated OLLI volunteer instructor, Saul has taught more than 75 military history courses at Clemson, California State University – San Marcos, Emory, and the University of Georgia. He has extensive experience as a Battlefield Tour Guide and has a BA in History from Georgia State University, as well as two masters degrees.

Gary Bertsch is an elected Life Member of the Council on Foreign Relations. Gary served on the UGA faculty from 1969 to 2010 teaching international relations and founding the Center for International Trade and Security (CITS). He was awarded the title of "University Professor", signifying highest recognition of his endeavors on behalf of the University's mission. In 2015 he was granted UGA's President's Medal recognizing "longstanding, extraordinary contributions to students, academic programs, and society."

Rebels in Arms

Number of Sessions: 1: Feb 6 (Mo) Z 10:00AM-11:15AM \$12

This class will examine how enslaved people and maroons turned war and armed conflict into opportunities to advance black emancipation and abolition. It traces how enslaved soldiers increasingly militarized resistance to chattel slavery from the end of the seventeenth century to the age of emancipation culminating in abolition during the U.S. Civil War in 1865. This class will take a deeper look into six episodes of soldier resistance in the anglo-atlantic as case studies.

Justin Iverson

Justin Iverson is a historian of slavery and resistance in early America and in the Black Atlantic world. He received his PhD from Northern Illinois University (2020). His book, Rebels in Arms: Black Resistance and the Fight for Freedom in the Anglo-Atlantic (UGA Press, Nov 1, 2022), examines how enslaved people turned war and armed conflict into opportunities to advance Black freedom and emancipation in the seventeenth century and into the Age of Revolution

Travel through Time

This two-part series is designed to complement the travel study program being offered in June 2023. The classes are open to anyone with an interest in the region. Those going on the trip will find it a beneficial foundation for the trip. The course will focus on Wales, Cornwall, and southern England with emphasis on the legends around King Arthur, the various groups who have occupied the area - Romans and Normans - and the strategic importance of the southern coast of Wales and England.

Tracy Elder

Tracy is retired from UGA. During her time at UGA she supported study abroad programs to Italy, China, South Africa, Korea, Ireland, England and Scotland. For the past 6 years, Tracy has hosted summer travel study trips for OLLI including two different tours of Scotland and the upcoming trip next summer to Wales, Cornwall and Southern England (originally scheduled for summer 2020).

Beyond Dr King: Civil Rights Digital Library's Story of Civil Rights

Dr. King epitomizes the twentieth-century freedom struggle in the state and nation. Yet, as this class will examine, current civil rights scholarship also decenters his role. Dr. McCaskill will discuss how her students involved in the Civil Rights Digital Library Project revisited King's legacy, and how this archive tells a fuller story of civil rights that is inclusive of Dr. King but makes visible and nuances more groups, places, and strategies. Using examples from her recent Digital Clinton place-based student team, Dr. McCaskill will explain why no study of the civil rights movement is complete without discussing the "hard histories" of slavery.

Barbara McCaskill

Barbara McCaskill is professor of English at UGA and associate academic director of the Willson Center. Her recent books include The Magnificent Peter Thomas Stanford, Transatlantic Reformer and Race Man (UGA Press, 2020), and Love, Liberation, and Escaping Slavery: William and Ellen Craft in Cultural Memory (UGA Press, 2015). She is co-P.I. for 'Culture and Community at the Penn Center National Historic Landmark,' a Mellon-funded project featuring public conversations, student research, and artist residencies.

F-117A Stealth Fighter Stories: Myths and Truths

From the start of the Top Secret Stealth Fighter Project, it was shrouded in secrecy. Few people knew of the project and even fewer were chosen to work on the special aircraft. As the project moved from testing to operational status, the public occasionally heard stories of strange aircraft that flew over the Nevada Desert only at night. These stories grew into myths. Even though some were true, others were complete science fiction. Come hear about this special aircraft and sneak a peek behind the curtain of secrecy that to this day has surrounded the F-117A Nighthawk.

Trecy Kent is a Retired US Air Force Master Sergeant, former Economics and History teacher, and current Financial Advisor with Edward Jones. He has a bachelor's in Business Administration, a master's in Secondary Education, and an Education Specialist degree in Education Administration. He currently holds a Series 7 General Securities Representative License, the Series 66 (Uniform Combined State Law Examination) license, and a Georgia Insurance License.

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How French Cinema Survived WWII & the Occupation

During the Occupation, the Nazi regime and collaborating Vichy government took over the French film industry. Their goal was to prove French culture was flourishing, even as many Jewish stars, directors, and producers were arrested and hundreds of filmmakers fled. Yet, despite the brutal repression, strict regulations, and dwindling resources, some amazing movies appeared during the Occupation. This presentation reveals the creative array of movies produced and the surprising range of women's roles that resulted during WWII. Some call this period a "Cinema of Paradox" because so many great films resulted under grim conditions.

Richard Neupert

Richard Neupert coordinates Film Studies at UGA and is co-president of Ciné. His most recent book, French Film History, 1894-1946 (2022) recounts the rise of French cinema and its prestige. He is the Charles H. Wheatley Professor of the Arts and a Josiah Meigs Distinguished Teaching Professor.

Cryptocurrency Explained

March to Victory

This course will take an intensive look at many of the actions of this pivotal timeframe for the battlefields of Europe during the Second World War. Topics include the liberation of Paris (August 19 to August 25, 1944), when the French Resistance rose up in conjunction with the approach of Patton's US Third Army, and the liberation of Belgium from September 1944 to February 1945. Learn about the ill-fated Operation Market–Garden, an Allied attempt to drive through the Netherlands and into Germany as well as the liberation of the Netherlands eight months later. We'll explore the Battles of Aachen and the Huertgen Forest, the Battle of the Bulge and the seizure of the Ludendorff Bridge, also known as the Bridge at Remagen. Light preparatory reading will enhance your classroom experience, and the class helps set the stage for a battlefield tour to the region with the instructor.

The Whitehall Textile Mill and Village: A Short History

Once called the "Manchester of the South," Athens played a significant role in the growth of the Southern cotton textile industry. The Georgia Factory (Whitehall mill) was one of the earliest textile mills in the state. This local history class will present information about the early development of the Whitehall textile factory and the establishment of its associated mill town of Whitehall. It will describe the mill workforce and mill owners, life in the Whitehall mill village community, relations between mill owners and workers, and the growth and decline of the Whitehall textile mill in Athens-Clarke County.

Dorothy Harnish

Dr. Harnish is a retired UGA research faculty member and a handweaver in Athens. She has travelled widely to study traditional weaving methods in foreign countries and has been researching the history of cotton mills in Athens-Clarke County for several years. Remnants of the Whitehall mill village along Whitehall Road seemed like a story that needed to be told. Working with other preservation scholars at UGA, she was able to write this local textile story.

Neoliberalism: Economic Growth Engine or Society Killer?

Neoliberals argue that government should promote economic growth by unleashing the power of market competition through lower taxes, reduced regulation, and expanded free trade and immigration. Neoliberalism became America's dominant policy framework under President Reagan; President Clinton's declaration that "the era of big government is over" certified its victory. However, in the face of rising income inequality, China's assault on manufacturing jobs, and the Great Recession, the Left and Right alike have begun to assail Neoliberalism as an unjust and ineffective governing philosophy. This course explores the strengths and weaknesses of this increasingly controversial approach, and considers possible alternatives.

Short vignettes of clinical cases will be used to illustrate key concepts in understanding how we make meaning of loss over the lifespan and how we can make earlier losses fruitful allies as we encounter change in the future.

A Harvard College graduate, he received his masters and doctorate from Boston University. This class has a twofold purpose. The first is to provide essential material on the history of the Qur'anic text and thematic context of its development in multiple domains necessary for anyone wishing to understand the Islamic World. The second is to open a window upon the Muslim world view presented by the Qur'an itself and upon Mohammad who, as the exemplar of the Islamic norm as perceived by Muslims themselves, was a walking Qur'an.

Life and Death on the New Supreme Court

Last year the U.S. Supreme Court issued two controversial decisions. The first expanded personal liberty to carry deadly weapons in public. The other limited liberty of woman to terminate a pregnancy prior to the beginning of life at viability. These seemingly contradictory majority decisions are both demonstrably bad constitutional interpretations. Why? This course explains how, independent of our personal political values, we can know that these decisions flunk all tests of good legal reasoning. These conservative Justices are politically biased. The rule of law requires impartial judges. Without them, our trust in government itself collapses.

Lief Carter

Lief Carter received his AB from Harvard (1962) and a law degree from Harvard Law School (1965). He was a Peace Corps volunteer in Bolivia in 1966–67 and received his PhD from UC Berkeley in 1972. Dr. Carter taught political science at UGA until 1995. He twice received UGA's Josiah Meigs Teaching Award. He taught from 1995 until 2008 at Colorado College. He is the author of *The Limits of Order*, *Reason in Law*, and *Contemporary Constitutional Lawmaking*. Professor Carter's book *REASON IN LAW*, now in its ninth edition from the University of Chicago Press, uniquely qualifies him to teach this material.

Fashion from Georgia's Bedspread Boulevard

In the early twentieth century enterprising women hand tufted candlewick bedspreads that sold through department stores and roadside businesses. Glyphosate (Roundup): Ideal Herbicide or Global Menace?

This class will investigate some of the controversies surrounding glyphosate, the world's most widely used herbicide. There is a wealth of mainstream research and factual information to indicate that glyphosate has a favorable safety profile for the environment and for human health, especially when compared to other herbicides. In some instances, the use of glyphosate can have environmental benefits: Its use allows no-till farming practices and can reduce the need for more toxic herbicides on farms. For homeowners and land managers, it is a favored tool for controlling invasive plants, aiding the restoration of native plant species diversity.

A New Lens: James Webb Space Telescope and Other Current and Future NASA Exploration Missions

The presentation will focus on recent accomplishments in deep-space exploration, including the James Webb Space Telescope (JWST). Less well-known, but equally important, work of other observatories all also her described. Still other space probes are yielding new insights about the Sun and planets in our own solar system. This presentation will highlight some of these most recent discoveries, and put them in the context of NASA's overall Space Science, Earth Science, and Aeronautics mission and budget.

Boston Massacre by John Adams

Scientists estimate that the number of birds that inhabit North America today is a mere 70% of what it was in 1970. That's a loss of over 3 billion birds in 50 years! 

Olaudah Equiano: The Self-Made African Man

This class will discuss the life and significance of Olaudah Equiano (1745?-1797). In 1789 he published in London his best-selling autobiography, which recounts an odyssey from being enslaved in Africa as a child to wealth and international fame. A key document in the movement to abolish the transatlantic slave trade, Equiano's Interesting Narrative is the foundational text in the genre of the African American slave narrative. Henry Louis Gates, Jr., considers Equiano "the father of both the African and the African American literary traditions and the most important black man in the 18th century.

Vin Carretta is Professor Emeritus of English at the University of Maryland. Vin's most recent books are The Life and Letters of Philip Quaque, The First African Anglican Missionary (2010), co-edited with Ty M. Reese; an edition of Letters of the Late Ignatius Sancho, an African (2015); Equiano, the African: Biography of a Self-Made Man (2022); The Writings of Phillis Wheatley Peters (2022); and Phillis Wheatley Peters: Biography of a Genius in Bondage (2023).

In this course we will discuss biological thinking before Darwin, his core ideas and their significance, as well as his reclusive personal life. Finally, we will survey the controversial responses to "Darwinism" right through to today, in both scientific and popular culture.

Firestorm over Darmstadt: The RAF, The Royal Family and the Destruction of a City

The City of Darmstadt is located south of Frankfurt and east of the Rhine River in west central Germany. During WW2 the citizens of Darmstadt reportedly believed that the Royal Air Force (RAF) Bomber Command was not going to target their city due to their connection with the British Royal Family. Queen Victoria's Grand Daughter lived near Darmstadt and the Queen herself had visited the city in the 1890s. This illusion came to a shattering end the night of September 10–11, 1944 — the night the citizens of Darmstadt call "Brandnacht" — the Fire Night. Area bombing of the city by the RAF created a violent firestorm that took the lives of over 11,000 residents within hours, the eighth largest death toll by aerial bombardment in WW2. This raid was followed by daylight bombing by the US 8th Air Force the next day. This talk will not try to address the many incriminations against the RAF, but will examine the facts about what happened on that fateful night in 1944. The presenter has visited the city and will include a number of his

The Battle of the Philippine Sea

The Battle of the Philippine Sea was fought between June 19-20, 1944. It was one of the most significant naval engagements during WW2. It eliminated the Japanese Imperial Navy's ability to conduct major carrier actions. It occurred in conjunction with the invasion of the Marianas Islands. The battle was the largest carrier battle in history and known as the Great Marianas Turkey Shot. Many claim it to be the most important sea battles fought during WW2.

Rod was born and raised in West Virginia, has lived in Athens since 1967, and is retired from the US EPA after 42 years of service. He graduated from Concord University and the University of Georgia with degrees in education and chemistry. He has always been a student of history, particularly WWII. Red Wolf Recovery: Conservation and Research Opportunities

Dr. Hinton summarizes red wolf recovery efforts in the southeastern United States to illustrate how research can be used to resolve key threats to wolves and promote recovery throughout their historical range. Such research will reduce our uncertainties about wild red wolf populations, thereby improving our conservation and management of the species.

Joey is the Wolf Conservation Center's senior research scientist and earned his PhD from the University of Georgia. His research background focuses on the conservation and management of canids, specifically red wolves and coyotes. His current research includes the ecology and conservation of red wolves and coyotes, assessing the taxonomy and ecology of canids along the Gulf Coast of Texas and Louisiana, and the ecology and management of moose in the Adirondack Park.

Mary Crovatt Hambidge (1885–1973) was an aspiring actress and a professional whistler on Broadway when she met Canadian-born Jay Hambidge (1867–1924), an artist, illustrator, and scholar. Their relationship would prove to be both a romantic and an artistic partnership. Jay developed the theory known as Dynamic Symmetry. Mary Hambidge pioneered new techniques of weaving and dyeing fabric. The Hambidge Center for Creative Arts and Sciences, formed during the mid–1930s, provides an artists' community situated on six hundred rural acres in the north Georgia mountains where hundreds of visual artists, writers, potters, composers, dancers, and other artists have pursued their crafts.

Virginia Troy

Virginia Gardner Troy is a scholar of twentieth-century art and design and a professor of art history at Berry College. She is the author of two books, The Modernist Textile: Europe and America, 1890-1940 and Anni Albers and Ancient American Textiles: From Bauhaus to Black Mountain. She has also published articles on mid-twentieth-century weaving, Appalachian weaving, Marie Cuttoli, and many other subjects. She earned her PhD at Emory University. She lives in Rome, Georgia.

Georgia O'Keeffe, most well known for her flower paintings, is called the "mother of American Modernism" for her innovative abstractions of the distinct places she has lived and visited. We will examine O'Keeffe's extraordinary distillations of her experiences in Texas where she first taught, New York City where she lived with photographer Alfred Stieglitz, and Lake George and Hawaii where she vacationed. No place, however, sparked her imagination and touched her soul as much as New Mexico. We will look at her first encounters in 1929–30, and how its varied topography never ceased to inspire until her death at 98.

Janice Simon is Josiah Meigs Distinguished Teaching Professor of Art History at UGA, where she has taught since 1988.
