## Freedom Riders and Civil Rights - Anniston, AL

Thursday, February 20

Enjoy a day trip to Anniston, Alabama, which includes three notable sites featuring Civil Rights, prehistoric and military history.

Discover the story behind the Anniston Freedom Rides, which succeeded in forcing the federal government to ban segregation in interstate bus travel during the Civil Rights Movement. The Anniston Freedom Rider National Monument comprises the original bus station and a mural and interpretive signage that commemorates the first attack on the 1961 Freedom Rides. This site will be specially opened for our visit.

At the Anniston Museum of Natural History, come face-to-face with prehistoric predators, go spelunking in a replica Alabama cave, stroll the African savanna, and visit Ptolemaic-era mummies. The Berman Museum invites you to take a walk through history, honor our vet-erans, admire the arts of Asia, and discover the dangers of espionage.

#### Hindu Temple, Atlanta, GA

Wednesday, April 2

The guided tour will introduce OLLI members to the history of the Mandir and to the Marti Darshan (sacred deities) and Nilkanth Verna Abhiskek (the sacred part of the Mandir). Time permitting, members can also attend the Arti ceremony, an ancient Hindu offering before sacred images to the accompaniment of a musical prayer. The group will enjoy a traditional vegetarian Indian buffet at the onsite Shaoyna Cafe, followed by an opportunity to visit the gift and book shop and to tour the extensive landscaped grounds around the Mandir.

Giving Voice to Linnentown is the true story of a young Black girl's family in the thriving Black community of Linnentown. Author Hattie Thomas Whitehead recounts how, in the 1960s, the City of Athens and the University of Georgia's Urban Renewal contract displaced Linnentown families, taking their homes for university expansion. Families were forced to move and separated. Decades later, Hattie chronicles her role in seeking justice for Linnentown and its descendants, aiming to give voice to a once vibrant community that was erased.

#### Hattie Thomas Whitehead

Hattie Thomas Whitehead became an activist during the desegregation of Athens, Georgia, later working 27 years in corporate operations management. She developed the Athens StepUp Scholarship Program that has awarded 85 scholarships since 2011. As a first descendant of Linnentown, she is president of the Linnentown Project and co-authored a resolution for recognition adopted in 2021. She wrote Giving Voice to Linnentown and is the playwright of the musical Linnentown. Hattie is a mother and grandmother.

Following the success of D-day and the Campaign in Normandy, the Allies still had to liberate France before they could concentrate on the Low Countries. African-American cemetery preservation is a crucial aspect of cultural history. Many African-American cemeteries have been neglected, often reflecting broader societal issues related to racial discrimination and erasure. Established shortly after the Civil War, The Gospel Pilgrim Cemetery is a once-prominent burial site for local Black community leaders located in Athens. Despite many efforts to preserve Gospel Pilgrim over the years, it has fallen into a state of disrepair. This course will discuss the history of the Gospel Pilgrim Cemetery, highlighting a few of the fascinating local Black Athenians buried there, and renewed interest in reestablishing trustee ownership.

#### Athens' First Antebellum Botanical Garden

This presentation examines Athens' first Botanical Garden. It was Antebellum Athens' most admired amenity and flourished from 1832 to 1856. The eight-acre garden was developed along Tanyard Creek by Dr. Malthus Ward, M.D., UGA's Professor of Natural History. Visitors remembered it as "a Garden of Eden, a paradise." The creek was transformed in the "natural style" into "a splashing waterfall, with a placid little lake, winding walks, shady dells, boats, bridges, a small greenhouse, and plant beds of exquisite beauty." When the garden was closed and the property sold, the proceeds funded the University's cast-iron fence and The Arch.

#### William Mann

William Mann, FASLA, Professor Emeritus at UGA, taught landscape architecture in the College of Environment and Design for 38 years. He also taught at the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology in Australia and at Michigan State University. He has been a lecturer at many universities and conferences in the United States, Canada, Europe, and Australia. William is the author of Landscape Architecture: An Illustrated History and Space and Time in Landscape Architectural History.

Blackman, a singer/songwriter, founded the Atlanta band Starbuck whose song Moonlight Feels Right became a top ten smash and remains one of the defining tunes of the 1970s. Bruce Blackman began writing songs in the fourth grade. He founded the rock band Eternity's Children in 1966 and Starbuck in 1970. His million seller Moonlight Feels Right became a hit and remains one of the defining tunes of the 1970s. He was inducted into Mississippi Writer's and Musicians Garden, the state's highest artistic recognition, in 2014. Bruce and his wife Peggy live in the Atlanta area where he remains active in the music industry.

Kirin is now an Art History professor at UGA's Lamar Dodd School of Art, where he teaches late antique, Byzantine, and Russian art, and serves as Parker Curator of Russian Art at the Georgia Museum of Art.

#### **Nelda Damiano**

Nelda Damiano holds a Ph.D. in art history from McGill University, specializing in Italian Renaissance and Baroque art. Since 2018, she has been the Pierre Daura Curator of European Art at the Georgia Museum of Art. Previously, she served as associate curator at the Cummer Museum of Art and Gardens and senior exhibitions manager at the National Gallery of Canada. Damiano has curated, organized, and published exhibitions on many prominent Italian masters throughout her career.

#### Tricia Miller

Tricia Miller is the Deputy Director of Collections and Exhibitions and Head Registrar at the Georgia Museum of Art, where she oversees the storage, exhibition, and preservation of a permanent collection of over 19,000 works of art and oversees the logistics and management of 10–15 temporary exhibitions per year. ## Conserving and Restoring Georgia's Threatened Trees

As is the case throughout the U.S., Georgia's trees are under increasing threat from multiple factors, including attack by exotic insect pests and pathogens. Various approaches are being tested or applied to conserve and restore native species, including some using biotechnology approaches such as tissue culture and genetic engineering. This class will discuss three forest species native to Georgia: American chestnut, eastern hemlock and green ash, that are under threat from exotic insect pests or pathogens and research at UGA and elsewhere aimed at conserving their germplasm and restoring them to the forest.

#### **Scott Merkle**

Scott Merkle is a Professor in the Warnell School of Forestry and Natural Resources at the University of Georgia. He received his B.S. in Biology from William and Mary and his M.S. and Ph.D. in Forestry from Virginia Tech. Merkle's lab has developed tissue culture propagation systems for over 20 forest tree species and hybrids. His lab does research on applying forest biotechnology for tree conservation and restoration.

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#### **Cotton: Its Fascinating World-Wide History**

Cotton is a fiber we all know, but few understand how it came to be so dominant and why its history is intertwined with so many aspects of civilization, particularly the first and subsequent industrial revolutions. We will explore what the fiber is, what the various species are, how it came to Europe from Asia, why it became the dominant crop in the South after 1800, and why the overreliance on growing cotton was a disaster for many small and tenant farmers in the South. Ian Hardin worked in a cotton mill to pay his way through Auburn University. He taught survey courses about fibers and textiles for over 43 years at Auburn and UGA. He was given the "Love of Learning" award by Phi Kappa Phi at UGA about the time he "mostly" retired. He believes that education never stops for those, like OLLI members, who stay young this way.

# Leader of the Cherokee Nation: The Remarkable Transformation of Galagina RC "Buck" Oowatie to Elias Boudinot \$21

This class will cover the fascinating story of a less-well-known historical figure. In 1802, Buck Oowatie was born into a prominent European-Cherokee family. Buck's father believed his children should receive the best education possible, so young Buck was first sent to the Moravian Mission School at Spring Place and then to the Foreign Mission School (known as the "Heathen School") in Cornwall, Connecticut. On his way to Cornwall, Buck stopped in Virginia where he met Thomas Jefferson and James Monroe. Once at Cornwall, Buck met Elias Boudinot. Boudinot played an important role in the founding of the United States. Buck was so impressed with Boudinot he asked if he could adopt his name.

## Linda Bishop

After working at UGA for 20 plus years, native Athenian Linda Bishop and her husband opened a mobile petting zoo. She has many diverse interests, among them archaeology, history, writing, photography, and genealogy. She has published several articles in the Oconee Enterprise on the history of Oconee County and in a now-defunct regional magazine. Linda is currently assisting with research for the Digital Atlas of Historic Oglethorpe County.

His research focuses on understanding cognitive-linguistic processes in aphasia and neurogenic language disorders, and developing assessments and treatments to enhance rehabilitation outcomes for these populations.

### Aisha Bushra

Aisha Bushra, a Pakistani physician, specializes in neurology and critical care. Currently, she works with Dr. Jing Xu on clinical stroke research. Passionate about health literacy, Aisha advocates for stroke awareness and education. Aisha's goal is to connect medical research with public awareness to enhance patient outcomes and improve community health.

# Sarah Grace Dalton

Dr. Sarah Grace Dalton is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Communication Sciences and Special Education. She specializes in aphasia, neurogenic communication disorders, and discourse analysis. Her research focuses on clinically practical approaches, including feasible discourse analysis methods, therapeutic adjuvants for neurogenic communication impairments, and the identification of biomarkers for treatment response and recovery. Dr. Dalton earned a B.S.Ed in Communication Sciences and Disorders from the University of Georgia (2010), an M.S.P. in Communication Sciences and Disorders from the University of South Carolina (2013), and a Ph.D. in Linguistics from the University of New Mexico (2019). Her work seamlessly integrates clinical practice with research, advancing the understanding and management of communication disorders.

She wrote Giving Voice to Linnentown and is the playwright of the musical Linnentown. Hattie is a mother and grandmother.

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# In Thomas Hardy's Poetic Workshop

Thomas Hardy was perhaps a finer poet than he was a novelist. Jonathan Swift is best known as the author of the sharply satirical Gulliver's Travels, but he was also a poet. Among his most interesting poetic works is a series of birthday poems addressed to his longtime friend and companion, Esther Johnson, whom he called Stella. The poems, focused on friendship and the passage of time, range in tone from the gently satirical to the deeply heartfelt. This class will provide biographical background against which to read and interpret several of these poems as they reveal the emotional side of the typically-acerbic Swift.

# Strawberry Hill: Horace Walpole's House and Garden

A nightmare inspired by his "little Gothic castle" drove Horace Walpole (1717–1797) to write The Castle of Otranto: A Gothic Story that has never been out of print since published anonymously in 1764. Walpole built Strawberry Hill over a period of 40 years. He was terrified that he was illegitimate: Sir Robert Walpole, his putative father (Prime Minister for 20 years) and his adored mother Catherine, Lady Walpole, were both flagrantly unfaithful. Critics have assumed that Horace was unaware of the gossip, but "Otranto," an exoneration of Richard III (1768), and a Shakespearean blank-verse tragedy "The Mysterious Mother" (1768), suggest otherwise.

### **Anne Williams**

Anne Williams is Emerita Professor of English at UGA. (7) What's a good asset allocation for me? These questions and more are analyzed with several computer models that use the last 28 years of data from well-known investments.

He's been retired for 22 years, living through stages of retirement and managing his family's investments. For several years before COVID, he taught courses for OLLI on investing. Campmeetings are a religious tradition arising from the Second Great Awakening of the late 1700s and early 1800s. Today, these unique gatherings—part family and community reunion and part spiritual revival—continue with week—long gatherings at campgrounds around the state. This presentation highlights the history of Salem Campmeeting in Covington, which began in 1828. The program provides insight into how the campmeeting has evolved from a gathering of rural local farmers in the early 1800s, through the upheaval of a schism in the Methodist church and the Civil War and into a modern—day religious gathering that attracts attendees from across the country.

# Joe Cook

Joe Cook works as Paddle Georgia Coordinator and guidebook author with Georgia River Network, but in his spare time he studies the history of campmeetings in Georgia. His family has been attending Salem Campmeeting in Covington since the 1820s, and he is a 58-year "tenter" at the campground. As such he has done extensive research on the history of the campmeeting and other campmeetings across the state.





If the host and presenter are still preparing for the class when you join, you may be placed in a waiting room for a few minutes. Once you're admitted to the meeting room, click "Join with Computer Audio."

Your microphone may be muted upon entry, and your camera turned off when you enter the room. To be heard and seen, click the options to "Unmute" and "Start Video" at the bottom left of the Zoom window. You're now ready to begin!

Tips for enjoying (and helping others enjoy) a Zoom meeting:

**Please mute you microphone if you are not speaking.** Background noise (doors opening and closing, phones ringing, dogs barking, laundry machines, dishwashers, microwaves, or microphone feedback in general) may not seem distracting to you but it may be for other participants. If a host mutes your microphone, please do not unmute yourself until you've eliminated the noise.

Please be sure that your face is no more than 3 feet away from your microphone so that we can hear any questions or comments you may have. You may also click the **Chat icon** at the bottom of the Zoom window (PC / Mac) to open the chat window where you can type your questions or comments for the host to read aloud.

If your camera is on, **please be dressed appropriately**. If you are not appropriately dressed, feel free to leave your camera off. We'll understand.
