Masters served as lead pilot and operations officer for the 551st Squadron of the 8th Army Air Corps; then he became commanding officer for a scouting force of P-51 fighter planes which scouted targets for bombing raids and weather conditions. He flew 28 bombing missions, and 25 fighter scout missions.

Katy Crapo gave the keynote address at the 2014 UGA reception honoring new retirees on April 24.

Hubert McAlexander has been honored with an endowment gift creating the Hubert H. McAlexander chair of English at the University of Mississippi. The gift was given by Dr. McAlexander's lifelong friend Lester Glenn "Ruff" Fant III and his wife Susan.

Connie Crawley, a senior public service associate and extension nutrition and health specialist, received \$15,000 in continuing support for the Cooking for Lifetime Cancer Cooking Schools which, working in partnership with the American Cancer Society and the Georgia Department of Health, present cooking lessons combined with cancer prevention messages for women across the state.

history of ideas. Her most recent book is Conversations with Cosmo: At Home with an African Grey Parrot. For two years she wrote a Sunday column about animals, "Cosmo Talks," in the Athens Banner Herald. OLLI HELPS WITH UGA STEM GRANTS

Thanks in part to support from OLLI, three faculty members at the University of Georgia have received one of five grants awarded nationally from the American Association for the Advancement of Science's Science. Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) Volunteer Program. They are Drs. Julie Luft in science education. David Knauft in horticulture. and Chuck Kutal in chemistry. Starting this fall, these three will be coordinating the Athens version of the AAAS National STEM Volunteer Program, which will bring scientists and engineers into local K-12 classrooms to help teachers make connections between concepts and practice, guide students' in developing critical thinking skills, and spark students' interest in science by making it relevant and connected to careers.

While the proposal was being written, David Knauft had contacted OLLI through John Rudy about the idea of networking through OLLI to identify current and retired STEM professionals in the Athens area with an interest in volunteering. That networking plan was an important part of the successful grant proposal.

STEPS TO A NEW PERSPECTIVE

Tom teaches tai chi classes for OLLI@UGA. His next classes: Intro Tai Chi Easy: Sept 17, 19, 24, 26; Oct 1, 3, 8, 10. Intermediate Tai Chi Easy: Oct 29, 31; Nov 5, 7, 12, 14. Location is Central Presbyterian Church. This essay was originally published July 17, 2013 in a newsletter of NAMASTA (North American Studio Alliance), an organization of body workers and instructors of yoga and tai chi.

Some seniors would have you believe that the signs of infirmity creep over a person so gradually that they are hardly noticeable. These people point to diminished hearing and eyesight as examples. At 35 years old they heard and saw everything just fine, but now at 60 they can definitely notice the difference: witness their eyeglasses and hearing aids.

Not me. I can tell you exactly when my knees began to give me trouble. One day, I could walk on the flat, cobblestone streets, and up and down slight inclines with no problem. But on the very next day—Thursday, April 11, just before noon, to be exact—I experienced a sudden drop in energy level and a definite discomfort. I was in China on a study tour to practice Tai Chi and to learn more about Daoism. We had landed in

Shanghai two days earlier and were now headquartered in the West Lake district of the gorgeous city of

Hangzhou. The program included visiting temples sacred to Daoism and Buddhism.

It was on the way to the Baopu Daoist temple that I caved in. All those steps! Temples, alas, are not situated at the foot of mountains. Oh, no. They're all built on mountain tops, and to really see them you need a cable car or a funicular, or be prepared to climb and climb, in one case to climb 700 steps up a path aptly named the Stairway to Heaven.

So I can peg the beginning of my rebelling knees quite precisely. One thing you learn in Tai Chi is to pay attention...to yourself, to your breathing, to your movement... and above all to stay in your comfort zone. As a result of my visit to the Baopu temple,

I paid close attention to future climbs, and I refrained from those with too many stairs.

I also learned to accept help from colleagues as we ascended and descended all those stairs. For example, I leaned on Henderson, half my age but twice my heft, and I got elbow support from Kelley, who cast a protective eye my way from time to time. My new status caused a shift in perspective, in that I now saw myself as a helpee, not a helper. Only later did I realize that it's not an either/or situation. I can be a helper and also accept help from others when necessary.

As for the knees, well, I consider the experience at Baopu temple a wakeup call, a timely warning that my shelf life is getting short. Happily there was no lasting impairment and no modification necessary in Tai Chi practice. But the incident brought home how suddenly...in just one day!... the body can change and how grateful I am for the assistance of others.

Some examples are "What To Do When a Friend is Dying" (ideas about helping friends through the final transition), "The Mysteries of Old Love," and "Alzheimer's Ravages

Old Love "....One recent post, "Who Are We?," strikes a parallel between our efforts to preserve landscapes and one man's fight to keep his memories. Here's an excerpt from the beginning and then the end:

"Warren, isn't it? You're Warren, right?" asked John. "Yes, how are you doing, John?"

"Ahhh, today is a good day for me. My memory is mostly here," he said as he continued to get dressed. John is in his early 60s. We were in the locker room at the Y. John had swum, showered, and was almost ready to head out. Months ago he mentioned that a neurologist had recommended more exercise to combat the onslaught of memory loss. That was as much as he wanted to share. He was matter-of-fact yet unhappy about his memory, and he seemed aware that he was in a long-term, losing battle. So everyday he comes to the Y and fights his destiny.... Many people fight to preserve historical places against further development and change. Places and things as they are, as they have been, give us

a sense of identity. We want to keep what we were because it's key to who we are. It's similar for John and his battle with memory. Memories identify him in relation to family, friends and others, to past times and various places. How else can he know himself? No wonder he's fighting.

Technically **Mark Freeman** is not a blogger—rather than maintaining a website, he emails out columns—but otherwise he is so much like one that we are including him in this article. When he lived in New York State, Mark wrote "The Washington County Curmudgeon" for an

upstate daily. (Webster's defines a "curmudgeon" as a man of mature

years who comments negatively but wittily on the foibles of mankind and the events of the day. Freeman says that a "mature woman" can also be one!) When Mark moved to Athens five years ago, a number of his readers asked him to continue. Changing his nom de plume to "The Damyankee Curmudgeon," he furnished those who wished with weekly comments by email. Mark's columns range widely from recollections of interesting characters he has met to progressive politics to what's good and bad in Southern life and cuisine. Here is an excerpt from one of them:

...My mother was born in 1895 and my father in 1890, which makes them, not Victorian, but perhaps Edwardian. When I was about two, they took a ... series of pictures, showing me, stark naked, slowly standing up as I emerged from a pail of water. As you might guess, I was incredibly embarrassed when I was perhaps ten and the album containing these pictures was passed around to family members at a get-together. My aunts were fairly staid, but no one ever said anything about the photos except "Oh, how adorably cute!" That album is still in the possession of my family. Technically, I suppose it's my property. Lately, I've been wondering: "Can a man be arrested and jailed for possessing 'kiddy-porn' if he has pictures of a naked two-year-old, posed, some would say, provocatively, if the pictures are of himself?"

It could happen, Mark suggests, in light of current laws. He also cites an example of parents who lost custody of their children for over a month for taking such photos. 
