"As you may have heard, a buddy (world-famous artist Bob Clements) and I won a 'Call for Art' competition to design and build an artsy bus shelter for the Athens-Clarke County Transit Authority. We're just kicking off the project. Over the

A new era is beginning at OLLI@UGA as we have changed registration systems for our upcoming semester and added an online community system for members to communicate with each other. Although the registration system is different from our online community system, which is being hosted by Mighty Networks (see page 11), the Board of Directors believes that the two systems combined will be a big boon for OLLI@UGA moving forward.

We did not take this decision lightly, as we know that change is never easy. Our Annual Membership Survey in 2017 showed that the top frustrations for members were our technology systems and registering for classes online. Our contact expired in October 2018 (which we extended to January 2019), so it was a good time to examine what the organization needed against what was being provided. When we originally signed up for Abila, our previous system, the Board was looking for a way to understand the data provided for us by membership numbers, registration patterns, etc., as well as to provide an online community forum, both of which we did not have.

During the past 12 months, we have looked at different registration providers

next six to eight months, there's going to be a lot of detail design and engineering, followed by cutting, bending and welding steel, getting it powder-coated (no paint!), and then printing and assembling slabs of plexiglass with bird photos. And finally, assembling and welding the whole thing on a trailer and delivering it to the Transit Authority, which will install it someplace around town. "If you want to keep up with how the project is going, this blog is the place! Guarantee: No spam, no more than one update per week, and generally a lot less than that. And you can unsubscribe at any time with a single click."

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Hikers Get a Peek at Tallassee Forest

No need to travel to north Georgia to see old forests, clear streams. and diverse plants and animals. OLLI class members had the special opportunity to experience a hidden natural gem in Athens on October 20, 2018. Tallassee Forest is a 310-acre tract of county-owned land with exceptional natural environments that include a Legacy Forest, which is more than 80 years old, a bottomland forest free of privet, as well as large canebrakes, clean streams, and a marsh.

A Conservation Easement held by the Oconee River Land Trust protects the environment while allowing nature-based recreation, such as walking, hiking, photography, picnicking, and educational programming. Numerous studies show that experiencing nature has a significant positive effect on mental and physical health and wellbeing. The area is not open to the public at this time; however, a park plan is being developed and, if funded in SPLOST 2020, will allow public access.

Why Ash Waste Matters to Athens

When journalist Dink NeSmith, President of Community Newspapers Inc. of Athens, spoke at a recent OLLI@UGA luncheon, he suggested that the Athens area should pay close attention to coal ash dumping in Banks County, because it could adversely affect the area water supply in the future. NeSmith, who titled his November 29 talk "Kicking Ash and Taking Names," told of the battle his weekly newspaper in Jesup fought with Republic Services, the nation's second-largest waste management firm, over the dumping of residue used to fuel coal-fired electric generating plants.

The Press-Sentinel of Jesup covered Republic's efforts to quietly obtain various federal and state permits to begin dumping up to 10,000 tons a day near. The paper exposed the plan and rallied community opposition, and, three years later, Republic has withdrawn the application for new permits and is renegotiating its 50-year contract with Wayne County that originally contained negligible safety protections.

In NeSmith's research of the Wayne County issue, he discovered that Waste Management, Inc., the nation's largest solid waste disposal company, has a similar operation underway in Banks County near

Athens. He suggested that citizens research what is going on regarding water projects in the area, follow any permit applications made in conjunction with the facility, and consider contacting local officials for more information and to let them know that people in the community are interested in following the situation.

Dink NeSmith discussed the battle that his Jesup newspaper fought to get information on how ash was being dumped in Wayne County.

PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

25 Years in Athens and 10 Years as an OLLI: Let's Get Ready to Celebrate

Dear OLLI@UGA Members,

As I reflect on the great things OLLI@UGA has accomplished in 2018 and look ahead to what promises to be a banner year for us in 2019, I am reminded of a saying I learned in my eighth grade Spanish class — *Poco a poco, se va lejos.* (Little by little, one goes far.)

OLLI@UGA has indeed come a long way, little by little. Almost 25 years ago, a small group of dedicated and visionary volunteers created Learning in Retirement. They put together a few classes and worked out the details of membership, communications, finances, classroom space, and technology. The organization grew steadily — perhaps with a few fits and starts — into today's Osher Lifelong Learning Institute, or OLLI@UGA.

Today we have about 1,450 members (several hundred of whom volunteer a great deal of time, energy, and talent) and three full-time staff members. We offer about 220 classes each semester, along with an extensive travel study program, luncheon speakers, and special events. We are enjoying record-breaking class enrollments and participation levels in our activities.

This year, we have reached another threshold in our development. The scale and complexity of our activities have outstripped the capacity of our current paid staff and volunteer leaders to sustain. I am pleased to report to you that at its November meeting, the Board of Directors approved the creation of a new full-time staff position, which we hope to fill early in the new year. This important step will promote the well-being of our excellent staff and help to sustain the morale of our hard-working volunteers.

As you have been hearing, OLLI@UGA has introduced a new and user-friendly system for online registration for classes and renewal of memberships. Please familiarize yourself with the new system in advance of the January 16 opening of registration for spring semester classes. I'd like to express my great appreciation to the Curriculum Committee for putting together an extraordinary set of classes for the spring and to Executive Director Tim Meehan for his efforts to make a smooth and seamless transition to the new registration system.

Looking a bit farther ahead, in the fall of 2019 OLLI@UGA will celebrate the 25th anniversary of our founding (as Learning in Retirement) as well as the 10th anniversary of our first endowment grant from the Osher Foundation. Please let me know if you would like to be part of the planning group for those celebrations. Little by little, we will continue to go far.

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Thinking of Taking Charge of Your Investments?

Six Classes on How to Become a More Confident Investor

Looking for some insights into how to manage your money in retirement? Join me for my series on financial investing, which will explore how you can become more comfortable with making decisions about your investments. Over the course of six classes, you will get a sense of what it's like to take charge of your own financial future.

Many OLLI@UGA members have accumulated investment portfolios through regular saving on the job during their careers. Those investments stayed mostly in the background of life, always present but seldom of day-to-day concern. But now at retirement, when salaries vanish, those same portfolios move front and center in your thinking.

It's at this point that many retirees take a long look at their account statements and realize they need help. You may wonder whether you have enough money to last through retirement. You may sense that periodic withdrawals in combination with low-quality investments and fees from financial advisors can gradually grind down your portfolio and jeopardize your retirement. Still, you may also find financial investing to be arcane and difficult, and you just do not see a suitable path forward.

If any of this story resonates with you — or if you just want to learn about investing — then consider signing up for the six OLLI classes on investing that I will present in February and March 2019. I have come indirectly to the subject of retirement finance, through experience and study in related fields. In my career, I taught, consulted, and wrote about forest economics. Because forestry is a long-term enterprise, many of the models rely on the principles of investing, and that work transfers easily to retirement. I started teaching personal investing at OLLI@UGA about five years ago. I manage my own investments, using passive investing, and my family has worked through many common retirement problems.

The classes begin with the basics and end with some ideas on how to become your own financial advisor. Each class will meet on Tuesday and Thursday in the afternoon, and more details are in the Spring 2019 catalog.

Here are the titles:

Investing #1 — What You Need to Know Abou	t Investing
Investing #2 — Retirement Investments in Ac	tion
Investing #3 — Retirement Withdrawal Strate	gies
Investing #4 — Annuities	
Investing #5 — Working with Financial Profes	sionals
Investing #6 — Becoming Your Own Financial	Manager

Taken together, the classes form a small curriculum on investing that takes participants from introductory concepts through taking charge of their own portfolios. All of the classes emphasize how investments can be organized and managed to serve common retirement goals. I will emphasize passive investing, which I will compare to active investing. Class members will learn to manage investment risks, asset allocations, investment costs, rebalancing their portfolios, and more. Although I teach the classes in sequence, you do not have to attend all of them. You may take one or two, or all six, depending on your interests.

These classes are not an advanced course on technical or fundamental analysis, nor do they include discussions of derivatives (such as options, futures, and mortgage-backed securities), junk bonds, private equity, hedge funds, or other complex investments. Also, I do not emphasize tax considerations, although I do point out obvious tax implications. Instead, the classes are aimed at people with a beginning to intermediate level of knowledge about investing. I use mutual funds or exchange-traded funds as investment examples. I also ask class members to share what they have learned along the way with their own personal investing. That helps ensure the best knowledge ends up before the class, and it keeps the classes relevant.

How to Use the New Online Registration System

Accessing the Registration Site

Go to olli.uga.edu. Select the Red Button for OLLI@UGA Members in the top right-hand corner.

On the Registration Site

You will need to sign in to your account using the Sign-In link under the main banner. If you are not signed in, you will not be able to add items to your cart. Membership is open for purchase.

You will be able to view classes for the Spring Semester 2019 ahead of opening at 10 a.m. on Wednesday January 16. Take some time to browse all the classes, you might find something you missed in the catalog!

Current Members

If you are a current member, you will have received two emails on December 10: one with your new username and one with a temporary password. If you have not received this email, please contact the office at (706) 542-7715.

Once you log on, you will be asked to update your username and password.

If your membership expires on June 30, 2019, then you will be able to add items straight to your cart.

If your membership expired on December 31, then you will need to add a membership to your cart before you can select any of the classes. We strongly suggest that you do this before class registration opens.

If you do not know whether you are a July or January member, then sign in and check the My Membership tab.

New Members

If you are not currently a member, then create a new account following the instructions on screen.

We strongly suggest that you go ahead and purchase a membership so that you will be ready to add classes when class registration opens.

Adding Classes

Classes are listed alphabetically and by category. You can see how many spaces are still available in the class before you register.

To select a class, click the "Add to cart" button. This will take you through to your shopping cart.

Preview your cart and return to classes by using the back button.

If a class is full, you can add yourself to the waitlist by selecting the "Add to Waitlist button."

Checking Out

Once you have registered for all the classes you wish to take, you can proceed through the checkout process. You will be able to return to add classes and events at any point using the same instructions.

(including those who serve other OLLIs and Lifelong Learning Programs) to see what they could offer our membership. Various stakeholder groups and members had a hand in the process, and we are grateful for all the member input we received. A special note of thanks goes to Zu Reuter for organizing all of the beta group testing.

The new registration system is designed to be much more user-friendly, with easy ways to find and select membership, courses, travel, and social events, using the same process no matter what you wish to purchase. It is also designed to be used on mobile phones and tablets, so we expect that it will improve the overall member experience.

The new registration system went live on December 10, so you are now able to access

the site in advance of general registration, which begins on January 16, 2019. We do strongly suggest that you visit the site ahead of time, especially to try out your username, change your temporary password, and read through the registration instructions. These instructions also appear above in this issue of OLLI Times as well as in the Catalog, and they are also available online on our website. By this time, you should have received two separate emails from us, one with your new username and one with your temporary password. If you do not believe that you have seen these emails, then please check your junk folders or give the office a call and we will provide you with the information.

Just a note on hosting. Although host registration opened on January 2, recruiters and members of the Curriculum committee got first refusal as we try to have those already confirmed before we open up — after all, if you have put your time and energy into recruiting a course, would you not want

to guarantee that you can participate in it? However, this is the only time that anyone can register in advance. From the longeststanding members to the leadership to new members, everybody registers starting Wednesday, January 16.

We feel that the results of this new registration system will be well worthwhile, and we thank everyone for your input every step of the way. If you have any questions about any registration process, please do not hesitate to call the office at (706) 542-7715.

Chasing Coral Wins Three Awards

Jim Porter, who has been a member of OLLI@ UGA since 2009, had a banner year with the film Chasing Coral for which he served as chief scientific officer and also as a cast member. The film won a trifecta of awards, starting with the Audience Award at Sundance Festival and then an award from Peabody the Awards committee as well as from the National Academy of Television Arts and Science.

Chasing Coral features a series of underwater photographs taken by Porter that provide a before and after glimpse of the coral reefs of Discovery Bay in Jamaica. "It's the kind of incontrovertible, visually arresting evidence that grabs a viewer's attention and never let's go," Porter says. "More than anything else, I wanted to get the word out about the importance of the climate crisis and our need to act now to prevent further catastrophe. The red-carpet reception this film has received tells me it has done that!"

Here are the two citations:

Award Citation for Chasing Coral from the Peabody Awards Committee, 77th Annual Award Winner Ceremony, May 19, 2018, New York, NY

Climate change is often described as a slow-moving catastrophe, a serious but distant threat. Chasing Coral, a Netflix documentary, upends that comfortable premise. As waters warm, coral reefs starve, with massive bleaching events occurring at record pace unseen beneath the waves. Approximately 90 percent of coral reefs may be lost over the coming decades. Chasing Coral dramatically illuminates this ongoing disaster, first immersing the audience in the gorgeous and diverse marine world that is the Great Barrier Reef, and then documenting - using underwater timelapse cameras invented specifically for the project - how vast swaths of it die.

The emotional impact is heightened by watching a team of passionate and idealistic young assistants witness the bleaching event, which suggests nothing less than a kind of underwater holocaust. Somehow, in spite of the scope of the tragedy, the documentary nevertheless remains hopeful, calling for engagement and urging action. With stunning impact and breathtaking beauty, Chasing Coral tells a story that matters. For bringing climate change and its deadly consequences into sharp focus, Chasing Coral wins a Peabody Award.

Award Citation from the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences, 39th Annual Award Ceremony, October 1, 2018, New York, NY

Chasing Coral taps into the collective will and wisdom of an ad man, a self-proclaimed coral nerd, top-notch camera designers, and renowned marine biologists as they invent the first time-lapse camera to record coral bleaching events as they happen. For this, *Chasing Coral* and its science team win the 2017 National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences Emmy for Best Nature Documentary.
