Registration for parking tags for River's Crossing are available online at [olli.uga.edu](#) (under Membership). Parking tags will be available for pickup from the OLLI office on or after the third business day following submittal of your application.

Each tag costs \$20, and may be used by others in your household. The tag will enable you to park ONLY in the River's Crossing parking lot through 7/31/2026.

The River's Crossing parking lot is monitored daily until 4:00 PM by UGA Parking Services. Please ensure that your parking tag is displayed properly in your vehicle when you park in this lot. Failure to do so may result in the issuance of a parking ticket with a fine of \$50. Parking after 4:00PM is free.

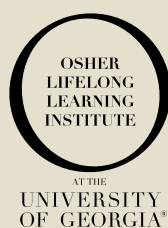

This rebellion ended tragically at Culloden, near Inverness, in April, 1746. The “Highland Culture” was destroyed and Scotland was never the same afterward. Everyone is born with an initial thinking style that can be recognized by their age at walking. This session is based upon Robert Alan Black's "Thinking Style" instrument, M.I.N.D. Design, initially created in 1982. His post-doc study concerned 300 different thinking-style instruments and discovered correlation scores ranging from 0.90 to 0.94, meaning that people mostly obtain the same results using a large variety of question styles. This session will include how to use Thinking Style Knowledge to: lead people productively; communicate effectively; team successfully as a member or leader; create large numbers of Ideas and generate many potential solutions.

Alan Black began studying thinking style quizzes, models, and theories in 1976. During Masters work at Florida Atlantic University, he explored several of these. During his PhD work at UGA, he used the Herrmann Whole Brain Instrument in his dissertation study of how to increase and improve learning when teaching creative thinking. That is when he developed "Creative S.T.A.M.P.S." Full time work as an international professional speaker included use of his M.I.N.D. Design questionnaire.

It is a commonplace of contemporary political discussion that economic inequality in the US (1) rose dramatically in the late 19th century, (2) declined after the New Deal, but (3) increased sharply in recent decades, rivaling the Gilded Age. We also consider the costs and benefits associated with both inequality and alternative ways of reducing it. Although we focus on economic inequality in the US, we address comparisons with other countries.

He was fired as a full professor and department head for being a Baha'i.

The Oglethorpe Echo in Lexington, Georgia, was founded in 1874. In 2021, the county's oldest business was destined to close on October 1. Veteran newspaper publisher Dink NeSmith stepped in and created a nonprofit to save the 147-year-old newspaper.

Forming a partnership with UGA's Grady College of Journalism, the weekly newspaper is now thriving. More than 200 Grady students have put "gold stars" on their diplomas by working for The Echo. Joseph Jacobs and the Robert Burns Club of Atlanta: A Story from the Archives

Jewish pharmacist Joseph Jacobs is familiar to Georgians as the owner of the drugstore at which Coca-Cola was invented. He is also the founder of the Burns Club of Atlanta. A major collector of Burnsiana (he had a library of 794 volumes of Burns material), Jacobs began the club in 1896 - and it still meets today in a replica of Burns's birthplace in Atlanta (a building Jacobs funded in 1911). This class will provide some of the history of the club and ponder the significance of Robert Burns not only to Jacobs but also to Atlanta and the South in general.

Elizabeth Kraft

Elizabeth Kraft is Professor Emerita of English from the University of Georgia where she taught from 1987 to 2020. Her field of specialization is Restoration and Eighteenth-Century British Literature, with side interests in classic Hollywood films and in the works of Leonard Cohen. This class is focused on a current project examining Robert Burns's significance to the South.

Leader of the Cherokee Nation: The Remarkable Transformation of Galagina “Buck” Oowatie to Elias Boudinot

This class will cover the fascinating story of a less-well-known historical figure. In 1802, Buck Oowatie was born into a prominent European-Cherokee family. Buck’s father believed his children should receive the best education possible, so young Buck was first sent to the Moravian Mission School at Spring Place and then to the Foreign Mission School (known as the “Heathen School”) in Cornwall, Connecticut. On his way to Cornwall, Buck stopped in Virginia where he met Thomas Jefferson and James Monroe. Once at Cornwall, Buck met Elias Boudinot. Boudinot played an important role in the founding of the United States. Buck was so impressed with Boudinot he asked if he could adopt his name.

Linda Bishop

After working at UGA for 20 plus years, native Athenian Linda Bishop and her husband opened a mobile petting zoo. She has many diverse interests, among them archaeology, history, writing, photography, and genealogy. She has published several articles in the Oconee Enterprise on the history of Oconee County and in a now-defunct regional magazine. Linda is currently assisting with research for the Digital Atlas of Historic Oglethorpe County.

How to use Zoom

About 15–30 minutes before your class is scheduled to begin, you will receive an email from OLLI@UGA with a link to your Zoom meeting and instructions for using Zoom on your desktop, laptop, or mobile device. Using Zoom on your desktop or laptop computer:

Click the Zoom link in the email from olli@uga.edu. Your default browser (e.g., Chrome, Firefox, Safari) should open automatically.

If you have never downloaded Zoom before, you will be prompted to do so:

For PC:

- Click the link that reads “[download and run Zoom](#)”.
- After your software downloads, click the Zoom.exe file at the bottom left of your browser.
- Zoom will begin to install.

For Mac:

- Click the link that reads “[download and run Zoom](#)”.
- Your new software will be located in your Downloads folder as a PKG or DMG file. Double-click this file.
- Zoom will begin to install.

Zoom will launch, prompting you to enter your name. Please enter your full first and last names so we can verify your registration, then click “**Join Meeting.**”

If the host and presenter are still preparing for the class when you join, you may be placed in a waiting room for a few minutes. Once you’re admitted to the meeting room, click “**Join with Computer Audio.**”

Your microphone may be muted upon entry, and your camera turned off when you enter the room. To be heard and seen, click the options to “Unmute” and “Start Video” at the bottom left of the Zoom window. You’re now ready to begin!

Tips for enjoying (and helping others enjoy) a Zoom meeting:

Please mute you microphone if you are not speaking.
