Carter Presidential Library and Museum

Thursday, January 22, 2026

The passing of former President Jimmy Carter in late 2024 brought renewed attention to the many accomplishments of "America's greatest ex-President." Renew your acquaintance with his remarkable accomplishments while visiting the Carter Presidential Library and Museum as part of a day trip to Atlanta.

What you'll see during your visit:

- state-of-the-art museum complete with interactive digital exhibits, tracing the life and work of Carter from his childhood in rural Plains, GA, to the work he and Mrs. Carter did around the world to promote peace and health
- · "A Day in the Life of the President" replica of the Oval Office
- Nobel Peace Prize awarded to President Carter in 2002
- reproduction of the cabin used for Camp David meetings which led to the still-standing
 1979 Egypt-Israel peace treaty
- artifacts from the 1976 campaign trail, Carter's Navy service, and key moments of his administration

Bus departs Athens to arrive at the Carter Library mid-morning, departing mid-afternoon to return to Athens by 5 p.m. Lunch at the Carter Center restaurant is included.

The Battlefields of Cowpens & Kings Mountain

Friday, April 17, 2026

Step back in time and witness the decisive turning points of the American Revolution on an unforgettable day trip to two pivotal South Carolina battlefields: Kings Mountain and Cowpens. First, explore Kings Mountain National Military Park, the site of the "war's largest all-American fight" on October 7, 1780, where Patriot militias secured a decisive victory over Loyalist forces—a triumph that changed the course of the Southern Campaign.

Then, continue to Cowpens National Battlefield to walk the ground where Brigadier General Daniel Morgan's Patriot forces dealt a devastating blow to the British on January 17, 1781—a tactical masterpiece considered the worst loss for the British since Saratoga. This immersive journey offers a powerful look at the courage, strategy, and sacrifices that forged American independence.

Col. Saul will lead a class and trip briefing the day before the trip Thursday April 16 from 10-noon at River's Crossing. Trip attendees should plan to attend the class in preparation for the trip. The trip will depart at 6:30AM. Following the Kings Mountain tour, members will enjoy a boxed sandwich lunch en route to Cowpens. The group will return to Athens by approximately 7:30PM. Snacks and water to be provided.

Alvin Ridley was a TV repairman who shuttered his business in 1984, started a flurry of accusations and civil litigation against local officials, and otherwise became a malcontent in Ringgold, Georgia. When accused of keeping his wife captive in their basement for decades and then killing her, Ridley turned to McCracken Poston Jr. to help. Autism advocates and true crime enthusiasts have praised Poston's account of managing a mysterious and difficult client. Ridley was first diagnosed as neurodivergent over two decades after his trial. Poston calls for better testing of suspects and better training of police, lawyers, and judges. Books will be available after the event for purchase and signing by the author.

McCracken Poston

McCracken King Poston Jr. is a former member of the Georgia House of Representatives and current criminal defense lawyer in Ringgold, Georgia. His account of representing Alvin Ridley in a 1990s murder trial is told in his book Zenith Man: Death, Love, and Redemption in a Georgia Courtroom (Citadel, Hardcover, 2024).

Harriet Powers: Athens' African American Quilter of International Renown

Harriet Powers, born enslaved in 1837 in Madison County, GA, died and was buried in Athens in 1910. What is known of her life story, her quilting, her Athens and Madison County locations, and her legacy deserves to be widely shared. Learn where to find her points of interest in Athens.

Jacqueline Elsner

Jacqueline Elsner retired in 2014 from a career as a public librarian with libraries in Maine and Georgia, serving her final 26 years with the Athens Regional Library System. She is a storyteller, an a cappella singer of Appalachian ballads and the poems of Byron Herbert Reece set to music, and a fan of Harriet Powers. She has been a program volunteer for decades at the Len Foote Hike Inn.

Imaging George Washington: America's Cincinnatus

Hundreds of President George Washington's (1732–1799) likenesses were produced in paint, marble, engravings, and decorative arts during and after his lifetime, more than any other president of the 18th and 19th centuries. Images of Washington were not just portraits but testaments to his heroic virtues, especially the concept of him as America's Cincinnatus. Like that Roman statesman and military leader, Washington willingly relinquished military and presidential powers to return to his farm at Mount Vernon. We will analyze how portraits and images of Washington by Charles Willson Peale, Gilbert Stuart, Jean–Antoine Houdon and others emphasized his virtues and greatness as the leader of the Continental Army and the nation's first president. We will see, too, how he was turned into a deity after death.

Janice Simon

Dr. Janice Simon is Josiah Meigs Distinguished Teaching Professor Emerita of the University of Georgia, where she taught art history for 35 years. A specialist in American art and culture, she taught a range of courses in American and modern art.

Volcanoes: Why Do They Matter in Our Life?

Volcanoes have always given rise to powerful emotions. They simultaneously fascinate and frighten those who live on their slopes when they erupt. Approximately 1.1 billion people live or lived within 100 km of active volcanoes that erupted in the last 10,000 years. Many eruptions, especially explosive ones, might occur without giving a clue of upcoming disaster. Volcanologists still strive to accurately forecast the likelihood, magnitude, and style of eruptions. This presentation offers cases of cohabitation between people and active volcanoes, the related pros and cons, and how modern volcanology offers information to thriving 21st-century societies facing the impact of climate change on a regional to global scale. In-class demonstrations, rocks, and slides will be presented.

Mattia Pistone

Mattia Pistone was awarded BSc in Geological Sciences at Università G. D'Annunzio in Chieti and MSc in Geodynamics, Geophysics, and Volcanology at University of Rome La Sapienza (Italy). He obtained a PhD in Earth Science at ETH-Zurich (Switzerland). Mattia is currently a tenured Associate Professor and director of the MAGMA MIA research group at UGA, and he conducts research on active volcanoes in Italy, Ecuador, and Alaska-Aleutians.

The History of Money and an Introduction to Cryptocurrency



This discussion class will be based on the illuminating and still profoundly relevant 2007 anthology, What Orwell Didn't Know: Propaganda and the New Face of American Politics. Orwell is now even more relevant than ever. Our text offers both an appreciation and critique of Orwell, addressing profound and disturbing changes in our media/political environment since his prophetic voice warned us of dangers that we still fail to appreciate or adequately address. We will also explore whether there might be various recent and very troubling issues that even the excellent contributors to this anthology could not have anticipated 18 years ago when they wrote their essays. What might be the most effective strategies for reducing the staggering amount of lying, mis/disinformation, censorship and self-deception that vitiates our discourse, polity, and diminishing chances for a livable future?

Andersonville: An Introduction to the Civil War's Most Infamous Prison Camp

The presentation heavily involves the diary of Private Robert K. Sneden of the 40th New York Infantry Regiment. Sneden's story begins in New York, moves to Virginia, then to Southwest Georgia and back to New York. Southwest Georgia in the mid-1860's could only mean Andersonville. What makes Sneden's story remarkable is the written and visual record he left behind. His resourceful efforts to document his experiences are hard to fathom today, and the roundabout story of how his diary was discovered and secured by one of the best museums in the country is also a bizarre tale. Sneden's written record brings up an important distinction between the differences between a diary and a memoir.

Fred Boyles

Fred Boyles served as a Superintendent of four different National Park Service areas. In those jobs, he "fought the Civil War" for 19 years, cared for a battlefield of the American Revolution and the home of a President. Fred also served in the Navy Reserve for 29 years, retiring in 2016 as captain after a two-year deployment to Seoul, Korea. A graduate of UGA and Clemson, he and wife Debbie are proudest of their three rambunctious grandsons and one very sweet granddaughter.

Improving Bone and Joint Health



What Did You Do in WW II, Daddy?

Nearly every Baby Boomer had a father, and in some cases a mother, who wore the uniform of the U.S. armed forces between 1941 and 1945. One common comment from children of U.S. veterans is they never heard their parent talk about the war; they had no idea what their father did, or what he experienced, or what he saw. Lawrence Saul

Military historian and Colonel (retired) Lawrence Saul served for 34 years in the U. S. Army, including tours in Germany, Holland, Belgium, England, Kosovo and other locations. He was one of the last veterans of the Vietnam War still serving on active duty when he retired in 2008. A Battlefield Tour Guide, he has a BA in History from Georgia State University as well as two master's degrees.

The Great American Songbook: Duke Ellington

This 90-minute class presents the life story of Duke Ellington through spoken words plus live musical performance and recordings. Hear about the childhood and family life of the songwriter as well as his professional career and relationships. Duke Ellington is known as a transformative 20th-century American composer, bandleader, and pianist who helped define jazz music and American music. Ellington's innovation in big band jazz, his collaborations with artists like Billy Strayhorn, and his ability to break racial barriers through global tours solidified his legacy as one of the greatest musicians of all time.

Susan Kraft has worked as a trombonist, pianist and vocalist in the Atlanta area for more than 40 years. She has played for many years in Atlanta area big bands and salsa bands, as well as classical music groups and pit orchestras for musicals. Currently she plays with jazz combos, Orquesta Taboga salsa band, Atlanta Blue Notes big band, and the Callanwolde Concert Band.

The Inheritance of War / The Legacy of Trauma

The inheritance of war has shaped and shattered our world. War's dystopian imprint on humanity is both our burden and our legacy. My story explores war trauma and its legacy through my father, a member of the US Army Air Force in WWII. A POW for 14 months, it details his experiences through three German Luftwaffe POW camps, the 'Heydekrug Run' and the 550 mile 'LONG MARCH' across Poland and Germany in the harsh European winter of 1945. His journey was horrific, arduous and difficult, his unresolved traumatic experiences life changing. But it only reveals half the story. It is a personal account of living in a post-WWII family who struggled with the unresolved psychological imprint of war. My story is visceral, honest and insightful detailing how my father's unresolved traumas are intricately woven into mine and is supported by current scientific research on the inheritance of traumas through environmental, genetic and epigenetic mechanisms. "The Inheritance of War / A Legacy of Trauma" is a non-fiction memoir with broad reading interests: History, genetics, epigenetics, neurology, psychology, psychiatry, mental health counseling and veterans health.

Jan Perkins

Jan Perkins is an internationally known artist, designer and aspiring author who holds a B.S. in Art Education and Art Therapy. Additionally, she spent two decades in corporate marketing and has been known as a wildlife artist since 2010, exhibiting in the US, UK, and Europe. Perkins was commissioned by the University of Georgia's College of Engineering for its permanent art collection: The Art of Engineering & Technology. She also authored a book about her father's WWII POW experiences, trauma, epigenetics and resilience.

Wine Styles of the Willamette Valley

Understanding the Composite Novel

In 2010, Jennifer Egan's book A Visit from the Goon Squad won the Pulitzer Prize for literature. Although the book has been described (and advertised) as a "novel," both Goon Squad and its sequel, The Candy House (2022), are arguably better described as composite novels, or novels in which individual chapters can be read as independent short stories. Also referred to as "novels in stories" and, in some cases, "short story cycles" (though these terms are not always interchangeable), composite novels present a compelling alternative to more traditional novel forms. This class aims to survey a selection of the classics of the composite novel— such as James Joyce's Dubliners (1914), Jamaica Kincaid's Annie John (1985), Amy Tan's The Joy Luck Club (1989), and Tim O'Brien's The Things they Carried (1990)— as well as newer additions, including but not limited to Egan's books. This class will also consider what, if anything, is gained from the "novel in story" mode and question how "transgressive" this form really is in its departure from the structure of traditional novels.

Colin Bishoff

Colin Bishoff is a PhD student in creative writing and first-year writing instructor at UGA. He holds a BA in English/Creative Writing and a minor in film studies from UGA and an MFA in fiction from Georgia College & State University. While his creative work explores his experiences growing up in the religious South, his critical work is grounded in media and adaptation theory. Athens First United Methodist Church at its Bicentennial

Number of Sessions: 1 \$14

The presentation includes numerous historical illustrations of the 200+-year history of Athens First UMC, founded by charter UGA faculty member Rev. Hope Hull, a close colleague of Bishop Francis Asbury. Methodist denomination founder John Wesley sent Asbury out in 1771 to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ. Asbury met Hope Hull in 1783, and Hull traveled the U.S. East Coast preaching and establishing churches until in 1801 he found himself in Athens, a founding member of the faculty of America's first state-chartered university, Franklin College, the University of Georgia. Dr. Jackson celebrates the bicentennial of the church's founding on its current site with a year-by-year review of the development of the congregation, its facilities, its leaders, and the fascinating stories of significant historical figures who have emerged from it, including six Methodist bishops. The history is interwoven with that of Athens itself, the leaders of the church and community most often being the same.

She won the Rash Award in Poetry in 2015 and 2017 and has published widely in literary journals in the US as well as in England, Australia, Ireland, and Northern Ireland.

Blimps-to-Drones: Archaeo-Geophysics at Rock Eagle and Rock Hawk

The class explains the use of drone-mounted sensors to characterize the Rock Eagle and Rock Hawk prehistoric effigy mounds in Putnam County, Georgia. We'll consider the "banality of evil," "the evil of banality," structural and systemic harm, projection and denial, and the tension between despair and hope. Participants will be invited to think critically and empathetically about evil's nature- and our own capacity to resist or perpetuate it. We will discuss such writers and thinkers as Hannah Arendt, Elizabeth Minnich, Reinhold Niebuhr, Carl Jung, Bill Moyers, Elaine Scarry, Ariel Dorfman, and MLK.

After hundreds of thousands of hours of study, scientists are unable to say how the image was formed. This class examines the unique characteristics of the Shroud; the scientific efforts to unravel the mystery; the various hypotheses offered to explain the image; and why the answer to the question of how the image was formed is important.

Since retiring, Tom has become the Athens Chapter Director for Reasonable Faith, a Christian Apologetics organization founded by William Lane Craig, one of the world's leading philosophers and theologians.

The Discovery of the Structure of Deoxyribonucleic Acid (DNA), the Molecule of Life \$14

This class is based on the book, The Double Helix (1968) by James Watson that concerns the discovery of of DNA's structure in 1953. Watson's book was an immediate best seller and controversial, not least because of his treatment of Rosalind Franklin. We will go through the process whereby Watson and Crick realized their model and how it could be replicated in living things. We will also discuss the Franklin controversy and why she did not receive a Nobel Prize. The book is both a classic and a great read! I recommend two versions: The Norton Critical Edition reprints several reviews of the book when it came out. Note the review by Jacob Bronowski (of Human Odyssey fame) who got it right on! The Annotated and Illustrated Edition by Gann and Witkowski (2012) is superb with many annotations and additional photographs that add significantly to the entire, classic tale.

Ian Hardin

Ian Hardin is a retired (from UGA) fiber and polymer chemist. He taught at Auburn and UGA and has been teaching for over 54 years, including current, one-hour freshman seminars at UGA on Scotland. He first read James Watson's book while in grad school and realized that discovery of the DNA structure would change biology forever and that Watson's book would be a classic.

Gian Lorenzo Bernini: From Renaissance Beauty to Modern Spirituality

This course will consider the career of the sculptor Gian Lorenzo Bernini (1598–1680) by contrasting his two distinct types of images – extraordinarily beautiful, classically-inspired bodies and ethereal, practically-ineffable spiritual recreations. We easily recognize this opposition when considering his Apollo and Daphne alongside his Saint Teresa. Both are marble, both imitate emotion and motion, both illustrate texts, and yet one depends on concrete, touchable reality for its effect, and the other requires the viewer to recognize the impossibility of what one sees. Bernini, born at the tail end of the Renaissance, becomes by his death a sculptor not of the ideal, but of the divine. This course will trace that development.

Shelley Zuraw

Recently retired from UGA's art history department, Shelley taught medieval, Renaissance, and Baroque art history for 30+ years. Her research focus is Italian Renaissance sculpture of the 15th and 16th centuries. For example, this year she gave a lecture at the Renaissance Society of America on ancient sacrificial vessels on papal tombs in Rome. But whatever you do in this field, Michelangelo is always the first word or the last.

Daniel Defoe's 1719 novel was an immediate hit and continues to intrigue us three hundred years later. The book provided Karl Marx and Friedrich Engels talking points for economic theory; it served as inspiration for the enslaved Harriet Jacobs and for Holocaust survivor Imre Kertesz; and it spawned many "sequels," from Defoe's own Farther Adventures of Robinson Crusoe to the television show Gilligan's Island and the Tom Hanks film Cast Away. The myth of Crusoe has also received strong post-colonial critique in light of the relationship between the title character and "his man Friday." Some find it a harmful book in this regard and have called for its boycott. In this class we will consider the various aspects that make the tale one of the most enduring and problematic narratives in the English language.





Imaging George Washington: America's Cincinnatus

Hundreds of President George Washington's (1732–1799) likenesses were produced in paint, marble, engravings, and decorative arts during and after his lifetime, more than any other president of the 18th and 19th centuries. Images of Washington were not just portraits but testaments to his heroic virtues, especially the concept of him as America's Cincinnatus. Like that Roman statesman and military leader, Washington willingly relinquished military and presidential powers to return to his farm at Mount Vernon. We will analyze how portraits and images of Washington by Charles Willson Peale, Gilbert Stuart, Jean–Antoine Houdon and others emphasized his virtues and greatness as the leader of the Continental Army and the nation's first president. We will see, too, how he was turned into a deity after death.

Declining Fertility Rates: Where, Why, and So What



The University of Georgia is one of the few campus law enforcement agencies in the country to have a full response Explosive Ordinance Disposal (bomb team) that serves as not only as a resource to the University community but also the neighboring areas surrounding us. The team consists of multiple EOD technicians who are certified in handling and rendering safe hazardous devices as well as multiple K-9 units that aid in the location of devices. The team is outfitted with a truck, robot, total containment vessel and numerous other items that they use when responding to incidents. The team will speak about the training that they undergo in order to be certified, the types of calls they respond to and showcase some of the equipment that they use while responding to calls. The truck and K-9s will also be at River's Crossing for the class.

Politics and Memory: Civil War Commemoration in New York City

In the decades following the Civil War, New York City built more monuments to the Union cause than any other city in the nation outside of Washington, DC. Ranging from simple standing soldiers to grand triumphal arches and temples, these monuments shaped commemorative aesthetics and iconography at the local and national levels. Unlike Confederate monuments, which were mostly initiated by private organizations, New York's soldiers' monuments were largely supported through city and state funding. These civic projects attracted the interest of competing groups – artists, politicians, veterans, and the public – who all sought to influence the growing commemorative landscape. Learn about the works and their creation in a fractious political landscape defined as much by municipal maneuvering as by artistic principle.

Two Grand Narratives: Essentialism to Existentialism and Big History

Historical narratives are simplifications but necessary ones. Otherwise, as one 19th century English scholar put it, "History becomes just one damn fact after another." This course will focus on two of the grandest of all historical narratives. First, in the history of ideas, is the long and tortured road from the essentialist thinking of the ancient Greeks to modern existentialism. Second, is the development in recent decades of so-called Big History, which sees ALL history- natural as well as human, and from the Big Bang to current events- as a product of a common evolutionary process. Multisensory Shakespeare

This class explores how East Asian cinematic adaptations of Shakespeare engage multiple senses to articulate women's experiences and amplify women's voices within other spaces. By combining sensory analysis with a gendered lens, this study examines how the selected films employ auditory, tactile, gustatory, and olfactory cues to represent female characters' gendered melancholia, desires, and agency. As the focus shifts from mere visibility, the multisensory emerges as the mechanism through which the other space becomes experientially distinct, shaping the female characters' lived experiences. Therefore, heterotopia provides the overarching theoretical framework, highlighting how other spaces in the films- whether natural landscapes, palaces, schools, or spaces of solitude- allow women to explore, negotiate, and reflect on their identities beyond socially prescribed roles.

Nayoung Bishoff

Nayoung Bishoff is a Ph.D. student in English at George Washington University, where she holds a Columbian Distinguished Fellowship. Her research centers on East-West comparative literature, with a particular emphasis on Shakespearean adaptations. Her academic interests include gender studies, cultural globalization, and film and media studies. Bishoff's recent works have been published in Literature/Film Quarterly, The Palgrave Encyclopedia of Global Shakespeare, and Borrowers and Lenders: The Journal of Shakespeare and Appropriation, among other venues.

When Stars Fell On Georgia: Georgia Meteorites, Impact Craters, and Ejecta Deposits

We will examine how geologists recognize and study asteroid and comet impacts in Earth's past. We will also investigate the occurrences of meteorite falls in Georgia including the recent McDonough meteorite. And we will explore the record of much larger impacts preserved in the rocks of our state, including the fallout from the Chesapeake Bay impact 35.5 million years ago that rained down across the Coastal Plain and the enormous 220-kilometer-diameter Roosevelt impact structure that formed more than 800 million years ago when a rock almost 30 kilometers wide penetrated the crust of west-central Georgia.

Scott Harris is an Athens native who is an award-winning K-12 science educator, planetarium director, and internationally recognized planetary geologist who works on asteroid and comet impacts around the world.

Modeling For Art and More: Co-creating Art and Helping Teach Medical Students Using Your Body

This course demystifies what modeling involves and introduces some unconventional opportunities like posing as patients at medical schools, even here in Athens. He currently works with OCAF, as well as The Georgia Museum of Art, The Winterville Cultural Center, the University of North Georgia, and UGA's evening Community Art School. In the past, he has presented for OLLI on amateur radio and on flying drones.

Cybersecurity Basics

This two-day course provides a comprehensive overview of essential digital safety and privacy practices, designed to help participants navigate the online world with confidence. Day 1 focuses on foundational knowledge, starting with an introduction to why internet safety matters, identifying the most common online threats, and understanding how scammers trick people. A key focus is learning concrete strategies for protecting personal information and developing a practical Safe Internet Habits Checklist. Day 2 transitions into practical application across various online activities, covering techniques for safe web browsing, best practices for secure online shopping and payments, managing social media safety and privacy settings, and securing personal devices like phones, tablets, and smart home technology. This class will be a lecture format. There is no need for attendees to bring their personal electronics.

Ross Everett has worked in Information Technology and Cybersecurity for more than four decades. He brings to the classroom a deep well of knowledge, enriched by real-world experience and practical insights into how systems truly operate – and how they can be compromised. Ross has taught cybersecurity for the past ten years and continues to work in the field, helping prepare cybersecurity professionals for challenging certification examinations. Despite his extensive expertise, Ross creates an approachable and engaging learning environment. He invites students to call him "Uncle Ross" fostering a collaborative atmosphere that feels more like a group of colleagues learning together than a traditional, rigid course.


Sandra Begani

About 15–30 minutes before your class is scheduled to begin, you will receive an email from OLLI@UGA with a link to your Zoom meeting and instructions for using Zoom on your desktop, laptop, or mobile device. These instructions are reproduced below. Videos showing how to use Zoom on any device are available on the OLLI@UGA YouTube Channel.

<u>Using Zoom on your desktop or laptop computer:</u>

Click the Zoom link in the email from olli@uga.edu. Your default browser (e.g., Chrome, Firefox, Safari) should open automatically.

If you have never downloaded Zoom before, you will be prompted to do so:

For PC:

- ·Click the link that reads "download and run Zoom".
- · After your software downloads, click the Zoom.exe file at the bottom left of your browser.
- · Zoom will begin to install.

For Mac:

- ·Click the link that reads "download and run Zoom".
- · Your new software will be located in your Downloads folder as a PKG or DMG file. Double-click this file.
- · Zoom will begin to install.

Zoom will launch, prompting you to enter your name. Please enter your full first and last names so we can verify your registration, then click "**Join Meeting.**"

If the host and presenter are still preparing for the class when you join, you may be placed in a waiting room for a few minutes. Once you're admitted to the meeting room, click "Join with Computer Audio."

Your microphone may be muted upon entry, and your camera turned off when you enter the room. To be heard and seen, click the options to "Unmute" and "Start Video" at the bottom left of the Zoom window. You're now ready to begin!

Tips for enjoying (and helping others enjoy) a Zoom meeting:

Please mute you microphone if you are not speaking. Background noise (doors opening and closing, phones ringing, dogs barking, laundry machines, dishwashers, microwaves, or microphone feedback in general) may not seem distracting to you but it may be for other participants. If a host mutes your microphone, please do not unmute yourself until you've eliminated the noise.

Please be sure that your face is no more than 3 feet away from your microphone so that we can hear any questions or comments you may have. You may also click the **Chat icon** at the bottom of the Zoom window (PC / Mac) to open the chat window where you can type your questions or comments for the host to read aloud.

If your camera is on, **please be dressed appropriately**. If you are not appropriately dressed, feel free to leave your camera off. We'll understand.
